Since CAMO was originally founded in 1990 the landscape of cancer care in Canada, and around the world, has changed dramatically, creating both new opportunities and challenges. CAMO is committed to engaging its members to determine how best to meet their evolving needs.

As a first step, the CAMO executive has worked on updating our Vision, Mission, and Value (MVV) statements to help shape the organization's strategic direction. We want to clearly define for ourselves, and communicate to others, why CAMO exists (mission), where the organization is going (vision) and what it stands for (values). 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CAMO to Launch New Mentorship Program

As recent graduates, CAMO members Drs. Andrea Fung (Queen's) and Maclean Thiessen (Manitoba) understand firsthand the value of mentorship through training and in the transition to junior faculty. To share their passion for education and mentorship, Drs. Thiessen and Fung were eager to join CAMO's newest initiative for trainees. Slated to launch later this summer, CAMO will pilot a new national, virtual, mentorship program open to medical oncology residents and fellows training in Canada.

Mentorship has been cited as an important factor in career advancement, productivity, and personal growth, and has been proposed as a possible protective strategy against burnout. Mentorship may also impact on a physician's professional identity and aid in maintaining physician wellness. Interest in a national, virtual mentorship program was high in a two-part needs assessment sent to both Canadian Medical Oncology Training Program Directors and medical oncology trainees. Trainees expressed interest in both group and one-on-one mentorship, and most respondents wanted to address topics such as fellowship options, career planning, research opportunities, financial planning, and physician wellness.

The current pandemic has taught us all to adapt to the virtual environment. In these times the need for mentorship and support is even more important, thus CAMO embraced the opportunity to create a national network of mentors for virtual mentoring.



After finishing her graduate studies and fellowship training, Dr. Ezeife returned home to Alberta where she recently took on the role of Provincial Lung Tumour Group Lead. She reflected on her own experience of having received Fellowship funding (from the Canadian Cancer Society), and the opportunities it provided. As there are fewer funding sources now, Dr. Ellard enthusiastically reminds us that, "A little bit from a lot of us would go a long way! "

Global Oncology

Global oncology is an emerging specialty at the intersection of global health and cancer care aimed at improving disparity in cancer outcomes between high income countries (HIC) and low- and middle-income countries (LMIC). Every year, approximately 10 million people die of cancer globally and over 70% of those deaths happen in LMICs, mostly due to preventable socioeconomic determinants of health and lack of access to care. The United Nations passed 17 interlinked goals in its "Agenda for Sustainable Development 2030" which provides a "shared blueprint for peace and prosperity" on our planet and to which all its member states have committed. However, equitable access to basic health care and closing this gap between HICs and LMICs are imperative to achieve such goals.

Canadian oncologists have over the years been crucial in improving lives of cancer patients around the world. As a national professional organization, CAMO could play a more intentional role in consolidating such efforts by advocating for more of such endeavors at the national level, developing direct relationships with cancer organizations in LMICs, and partnering with international organizations. For example, the American Society of Clinical Oncology has a well-established international outreach program that funds the "International Development and Education Award (IDEA)" which matches international oncologists with North American mentors and funds a short visit to the mentor's institute. Having had the opportunity to be involved closely with IDEA and similar efforts over the years, I can attest to how such experiences bring knowledge, resources, and mentorship to the doorsteps of cancer institutions in both HICs and LMICs. Working in such a symbiotic relationship can help fill gaps in knowledge and experience which are unique between and among HICs and LMICs.

Did you know?

Occupational diseases, including cancers, are under recognized and under reported. As a result, compensation to patients with workrelated cancers is not as common as it should be. In 2020, the Occupational Cancer Research Centre (OCRC) in Ontario released a comprehensive report, "Using Scientific Evidence and Principles to Help Determine the Work-Relatedness of Cancer," which reviews the topic in detail.
